

IN-PERSON SAFETY MEASURES

As NAPNAP plans our event, we are working with state and local health officials and the Rosen Shingle Creek staff to promote healthy behaviors, environments and processes that reduce the spread of COVID-19. Participants will be required to complete daily screening questionnaires and temperature checks prior to entering our meeting space. Masks will be required at all conference events.

At registration check-in, floor markings will indicate six foot distances. You can use touchless kiosks for badge printing and registration bag pick up. In education sessions, there will be a variety of seating arrangements to maintain the required distance limit and traffic patterns will help participants get to their seats. There will be separate entrance and exit doors whenever available. Staff will strictly enforce social distancing capacity limits in meeting rooms and gathering spaces.

Our networking and food events will provide more pre-packed options, staggered stations and food

served by staff who are trained in safe food handling. The exhibit hall has been redesigned to widen the aisles and increase space between each booth making connecting with industry partners safer. With beautiful weather in Florida in March, open-air environments for food service events will be used, when possible.
